Space Station

A Quiet Space for Everyone

At the Building for Kids, we strive to make our play-based learning environment a welcoming place where all families can thrive. Amidst the excitement of our museum, we recognize that some visitors, particularly those with autism or sensory sensitivities, may occasionally need a quiet place to take a break. In our continuous efforts to best serve all members of our community, we have recently opened an updated quiet room called the Space Station, designed to better support the autism community (although everyone is welcome to use the room).

The new space theme of our redesigned quiet room carries dual significance: it uses the tranquil imagery of outer space and creates "space" away from the stimulating museum environment for those who need it. Updates to the room include updated lighting, themed graphics, and new interactives, all designed to embody the outer space theme. Additionally, we have enhanced our self-regulation tools to include noise-canceling headphones, sunglasses, and various fidgets.

To ensure that sensory resources are available beyond the room, we have also introduced mini "Space Stations" at various locations throughout the museum. These mini stations feature bags containing self-regulation tools like the ones found in the room. This continuation of the Space Station allows families to access these tools wherever they are in the museum, promoting a sense of empowerment and autonomy.

This project was inspired by insights from our partners, especially the Autism Society of Greater Wisconsin and their local Fox Valley chapter, who work closely with families of children on the autism spectrum. Their quidance helped us understand various sensory



needs and the best tools and techniques to address them. With this knowledge, an intern from Lawrence University assisted us in incorporating a range of these self-regulation tools and techniques into the room.

The Space Station project was made possible thanks to funding from Lawrence University, the SAC Development Disabilities Fund within the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region, and the Appleton Rotary Foundation - Helen Thom Roemer Fund.

Our Longstanding Commitment to Inclusion

After more than a decade of deep collaboration, the BFK was recognized in 2020 as the first Autism Friendly Community Partner in the state of Wisconsin by the Autism Society of Greater Wisconsin for our dedication to providing opportunities for families with children on the autism spectrum.

Sensory Superstars: Monthly Event

To further support those with sensory sensitivities, we offer Sensory Superstars, a free program for families in the autism community that allows them to experience the museum in a lower sensory environment. During this program that takes place every third Sunday of the month, we create a quieter setting with dimmed lighting, no music, and selected exhibits turned off. Starting this fall, we are also introducing a Sensory Superstars version of our Character Playdates!

Summer Explorer Camps

Great for kids that love a challenge, our coding & robotics-themed camps offer an exciting journey filled with STEM-based activities. Start your day with an engaging robotics session led by Amcor, and continue the adventure in the afternoon with more STEM activities in The Lab.

Food with Sustainable Kitchens

July 21 - 25 & August 18 - 22

Perfect for introducing your child to healthy eating habits and a love of cooking, our food-themed sessions explore concepts within the culinary arts. Learn scratch cooking techniques with Sustainable Kitchens in the morning, and create healthy snack recipes while exploring Food to Grow in the afternoon.

Music with Local Artists

July 28 - August 1 & August 25 - 29 Embark on a musical journey during our music-themed camps. Start your day with

an interactive session led by our special quests, Marisol & Bernardo. In the afternoon, keep the excitement going by making music with friends and deepening your understanding of musical concepts.

Now reaching over 50 kids and their families twice each week, this free program is helping more 3 and 4-year-olds prepare for kindergarten and build connections with their peers through play-based learning. 1. How does your family engage with the Building for Kids?

We absolutely love participating in the Jr. Explorers, Early Explorers, and Welcome Baby programs—as well as all the fun character events! Each one adds something special to our experience at the Building for Kids.

2. What has your family gained from participating in our Early Childhood programming?

As a stay-at-home mom, my children haven't had much exposure to other kids, and they've never been in a drop-off setting before. The programs at the Building for Kids have been a game-changer, helping them build confidence and develop the social skills they'll carry with them into school. Every morning, my oldest wakes up and asks if it's a Jr. Explorers day.
